OSHA Lead Exposure Training — General Industry

Regulatory Crosswalk

Topic or Requirement	Regulatory Citation	Plain-English Requirement
Scope and limits	29 CFR 1910.1025(a)-(c)	Apply the federal general-industry lead standard. The action level is 30 micrograms per cubic meter over eight hours; the permissible exposure limit is 50 over eight hours, with the standard's adjustment for longer workdays.
Exposure determination	29 CFR 1910.1025(d)	Determine employee exposure without credit for respirators. Conduct and repeat monitoring under the applicable conditions and provide written employee notification of results and required corrective information.
Controls and compliance program	29 CFR 1910.1025(e)	Use required engineering and work practice controls with supplemental protection as prescribed. Establish the written compliance program and review and update it at least annually.
Respirators and clothing	29 CFR 1910.1025(f)-(g)	Provide and ensure use of the required respiratory protection and protective clothing. Follow the lead-specific program provisions and safe cleaning, laundering, storage and handling requirements.
Housekeeping and hygiene	29 CFR 1910.1025(h)-(i)	Maintain surfaces as free as practicable of lead accumulation. Follow restrictions on cleaning methods and provide the required change rooms, showers, lunchroom facilities and hygiene practices.
Medical surveillance	29 CFR 1910.1025(j)	Provide surveillance for employees meeting the exposure and duration criteria. Follow biological monitoring, examination, notification, consultation and multiple physician review requirements.
Medical removal protection	29 CFR 1910.1025(k)	Remove employees from covered exposure when required by the standard and follow return-to-work criteria. Provide the applicable medical removal protection benefits and follow-up.
Training, signs and records	29 CFR 1910.1025(l)-(n), (j)(4)	Inform affected employees and provide the required initial and at-least-annual training for covered employees. Include actual operations, controls, respirators, medical arrangements and program access. Maintain required signs, records and access. Include the required warning against routine chelation and its physician-supervision limits.
